

LI: To identify the Equator, Arctic and Antarctica on a world map/ globe. Start of term learning: LI: To name and locate the seven continents and five oceans of the world. LI: To use an atlas to locate major countries within Europe.	LI: To use a wide range of geographical sources in order to investigate Antarctica. LI: To name and locate the Equator, Northern and Southern hemispheres, tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, Arctic and Antarctic circles and date time zones.
